

Main issues



- Reduced but ongoing use pesticides/fertilizer
 - Low soil and water quality
 - ➤ Low biodiversity: less flowers, insects, birds
 - > Lack of knowledge
- Non-functioning agri environment schemes
- Rising rents and land prices
- History of landscape is invisible
- No relation with nearby consumer market





Result-based Payments



- + Taxpayers get proven value for their money
- + Grant flexibility to farmers
- + Farmers can take pride
- + Easy-to-perform monitoring
- + Suitable basis for consumer labels
- Additionality
- Less suitable for mobile species
